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

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

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

Q. In the Apostles Creed, why do we bow only at the portion of Virgin Mary, and not any of the other significant/important articles?

AVEENA / SINGAPORE

Thanks for the question. In order to answer L the question, we need to understand different kinds of bows and their purposes during the liturgy. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM 137, 275) which explains the prayers and actions during the Holy Mass delineates different kinds of bows and their intentions. We are asked to bow and make other signs at different times during the Mass. There are two kinds of bows we make during the Mass - a simple bow of the head and a more profound bow of the body. Then there is the act of adoration of our God, which is known as genuflection.

"The bow signifies reverence and honor shown to the persons themselves or to the signs that represent them" (GIRM 275). The same number further explains that a bow of the head is made when the three Divine Persons are invoked and at the name of Jesus. of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and at the name of the saint whom we honour during the Mass. Before the reception of the Holy Communion also we bow our head.

A profound bow of the body is made during the Creed, as mentioned in your question, in order to honour the most important act in the history of humanity - God becoming man.

This is the kind of bow we make to the altar, when passing in front of it or entering the sanctuary. There are other occasions when priests and deacons make profound bows during the Mass.

We genuflect toward the Eucharistic Lord. We are expected to genuflect upon entering and leaving Church toward the Tabernacle - if and when the Eucharist is present. The same is done by the priests and servers when they enter and leave, but not during Mass. On the Solemnities of the Annunciation and of the Nativity of the Lord (Christmas), all genuflect, instead of bowing during the Creed.

From the above discussion it is clear that we make a profound bow at the words of the Creed, "by the power of the Holy Spirit he was born of the Virgin Mary, and became man." And here the profound bow is not to the name of the Blessed Virgin Mary, but to the great mystery of our salvation - God becoming man. This profound bow signifies our great respect and gratitude to Jesus Christ who, though God, did not hesitate to come among us as a human being, participating in our human condition in order to redeem us from sin and restore us to friendship with God.

rather words such as covenant, friendship, promise, communion and closeness.


Intimacy with Jesus is not just for mystics

'I am from a backward fishing family and grew up facing all kinds of deprivations. But, none of that stopped me from dreaming." Sabin enthusiastically narrated his personal journey. Three things he ought to pray whenever he visited a new Church - his father always told him. And he would pray faithfully - for a high-quality camera; that he would be the best cinematographer; and to do some great media work. If anyone had heard about these big dreams of a poor boy from a sea-side village in India, they would have laughed. So, he never told anyone about it. "The great turn in my life happened with my coming into an active Jesus Youth group. Now I am only 23 and, can you imagine, talent wise, professionally and by way of having opportunities to handle expensive equipment, I have done marvelously. All this happened through the unimaginable opportunities and contacts I get in this movement."

I met Sabin in the context of Covid 19. To tell you a little background, many months back Kerala Jesus Youth leadership wanted to develop some clear plans for different talent groups. Main leaders of JY Music, Dramatics, Art and Media started

meeting regularly. I never missed any of those extremely interesting Emmaus Gatherings. They planned a big 'Talents Meet' in April. Then came the bolt from the blue, the Corona Virus. All were confused about the future of these plans. But then, discussions were shifted to online platforms and, once again, everyone became busy and enthusiastic. Leaders, once again, began meeting together and trainings for specific skill-areas were organized separately, all online. This young-man Sabin is a front-runner of the media section and, after one such meeting he was sharing with me about his background and the importance of grooming talents in Jesus Youth style.

LIKE A NURSERY FOR YOUNG PLANTS

I remember, one of the first trainings we had was in February 1978, and we proposed a preparatory work for the participants. They were coming from 16 zones and each group was to come prepared with some creative presentation. Those of us from Ernakulam prepared a musical drama entitled 'The Call'. And youth from each zone came with different presentations. These were very small steps, but one thing was clear, when many other renewal groups were focusing solely on prayer and preaching, Jesus Youth groups reserved a special place for

talents. What was the vision behind it? Discovering various God given talents and creating platforms to develop them was as important as growing in prayer and holiness.

'Jesus Youth '85' was an unforgettable event for almost everyone, not only because of the very interesting preparation that led to the program, but more because of the unexpected color, sounds and mirth in it. The whole crowd came alive with an awareness and display of talents. From that time onwards every Jesus Youth program has been an opportunity for many talent specific groups to gather, dream, practice and present something beautiful.

When young people come into Jesus Youth everyone of them see something fascinating: musicians see many excellent music bands starting with the Rex Band, art enthusiasts witness different kinds of exhibitions and beautiful stage arrangements that youth do, those who like dramatics and dance notice highly creative skits and dances, those who want to try their hands on writing see how attractive brochures and magazines like Kairos are born through youth effort, and when they go on online platforms, there too are innumerable signs of Jesus Youth creativity.

In brief, many youth who come to Jesus Youth groups see plenty of

The result is, over the years so many talented experts, attractive initiatives and men and women of high leadership emerge out of the movement. There is something here that help build people in personal excellence launching them on to a path of continuing growth. But what are some of these talent promotional elements in the movement?

• For a person, his/her walk with

the movement starts with someone introducing Jesus and spirituality in a creative and interesting way

- When they come to groups, they receive much support for inner maturity and to overcome personal conflicts, this in turn unleashes one's creative energy
- While in most other places one's talent or usefulness is focused, here the attention is on the person and his/her wholesome growth
- Programs and conferences become easy canvases for using of talents, with rich variety and abundant freedom
- There are a lot of opportunities in the movement, even freshers, to move closely with experts of different professions, in a warm and friendly setting
- As there is almost zero material remuneration or reward, even professionals don't receive any payment for the work or take credit for excellence of output

Before he put the phone down Sabin told me, "Eddy chetta, today's youth spend unbelievable sums of money to study their dream courses,


and then run around for a mentor or an opportunity to try their skills. I couldn't afford any of that. But in Jesus Youth groups I got unimaginable opportunities. Conferences became best forums of skill training for me." While out there in the society youth must impress everyone to get an opening, in Jesus Youth there are not only rich avenues, but here all are so helpful and accepting. Here even experts will tell you, 'Try your hand and don't be afraid to commit mistakes!' One thing more, many highly talented youth end up in bad habits and addictions, ruining their career. But in Jesus Youth you are provided with a safe shield, a shield of faith and healthy habits of mind, heart and body. Finally, he said, "this is the reason why I try so hard to bring my talented friends to Jesus Youth. And I want them to stick on here."



Sherin Alexander narrates how it was a loving sentence from her father that made her realise the power of lies dominating her life

few months after our wedding, my hubby and I visited my parents' house. At the end of the weekend, before we left the house, I kept a letter I had written for them on their dresser in their room. Our wedding day and the few weeks following it had given me a strong realisation and feeling of gratitude for being their beloved daughter. So, in the letter, I thanked my dad for being a good reflection of Father God in the way he loved, protected, provided and cared for me and I thanked my mom for being a good reflection of the Church through her nurturing, selfless and tender care for me.

Towards the end of last year, during one of my personal prayers, I had received a message of healing and restoration from the Lord for me in the year 2020. It was further confirmed when a friend gifted me

the book "Be Healed" by Bob Schuchts. Since I could use some physical and fertility healing, I was especially relieved to receive the message of healing.

A few months ago, I emailed my flight itinerary information to my dad telling him that I would be coming into Chicago from Florida for my friends' wedding, but I would be arriving at midnight on Thursday since that was the only flight that worked for me. I was sad to be of inconvenience to him since we wouldn't get home till at least 1am and he had to work the next morning. Dad replied saying he was happy that I was coming into town and the arrival time of the flight was not inconvenient for him to pick me up. The email ended with "It is my duty and my privilege." This sentence ignited a series of reflections in me.

First and foremost, that took me to God the Father's love for me. In my prayer, I imagined Father God saying to me "It is my duty and my privilege to shower good things on you. It is my duty and my privilege to love you and provide for you and protect you. It is my duty and my privilege to give you all the graces you need for the journey." I never thought about it that way: that Father God would consider it his duty and his privilege!

Further prayer and reflection based on this thought along with my spiritual readings led me to recognize certain lies I had long believed and did not know about: the lie that my strong personality and convictions are a burden to others... that I was often a financial burden with my big dreams and medical conditions. The reality is that no one has ever said these things to me and yet, somehow I believed these lies, unknowingly.

My dad's statement was truly a reminder for me of how precious and

valued I am also to Father God. It reminded me of my status as the beloved daughter in an even more deeper and newer way. It spoke the truth to a hidden area in me that was convinced of lies of being a burden. I felt an urgent need for confession as I realized this.

I used a resourceful pamphlet to help me prepare for this confession. It explained that at the root of the seven deadly sins (pride, envy, greed, gluttony, lust, anger, sloth) could be lies we have believed, which often cover our deeper fears in our hearts. The pamphlet had a prayer model for renunciation of the lies and fears identified. Using that model, I prayed, "In the name of Iesus, I renounce the lie and fear that I am a burden, which has led me to the pride of selfreliance, invulnerability and protective mechanisms. Father, I trust that You are always with me and that I am precious, accepted and valued as I am in your eyes."

After confession, as I walked out of the confessional, I felt lighter and renewed. I was glad that it was with this that the Lord wanted to start off His promise of healing me this year!

When I shared my reflections and experiences with my friends, I realized how common this lie is and how this lie takes different forms in people's lives. May God's unconditional and merciful love reach all the hidden, dark and unknown areas of our lives and may we experience renewed joy and confidence in our sonship and daughter-ship.



LAM encourages us to view christianity and science as two sides of the same coin rather than two different entities.







hile many may have placed science and religion on two extreme polarities, as a Catholic scientist, or a scientific Catholic, I have always seen them as complementary rather than contradictory. As one who has been brought up by a pair of loving parents with education of reasons and rationales, the grace of the Lord has trained me to be a PhD chemist/scientist. So, whenever I've heard people putting science and religion on different polarities, I'd always respond with a smile. I'm not an expert in theology, nor an expert in every aspect of science, but I would like to draw from my own experience why science and christianity (as I am a Catholic) are not opposite ends but rather, go hand-in-hand in our truth-seeking process.

One of the biggest similarities between science and christianity is that both strive to seek the truth. In other words, instead of trying to disprove one another, both have a common goal. As Albert Einstein puts it, "Science without religion is lame, religion without science is blind".

Science and christianity are both complementary in our quest to find and understand what the truth is. While science builds understanding based on observations in the physical world, christianity deepens it through the human race's experience of divine love. Both of them neither come out from nothing nor from pure imagination. Both of them are built upon a basis, and interpolate/extrapolate using our current intellect. Both are not rigid doctrines: advancement in technology and scientific understanding may overflow old theories and hypothesis – it is like quantum physics contrasting classical mechanics; and the relationship between man and God deepens as human experience of divine love intensifies.

Another similarity is that there are still huge perplexities in the understanding of both science and christianity. Where do we come from? What was out there before the Big Bang? Is string theory true? There are always so many questions when we trace back to the very beginning. In such uncertainties, scientists would set up postulates - a proposed theory that is accepted until it has been rebuked by proofs or evidence stating otherwise. This could be faith in science. It is not a blind faith, but is based on proofs and evidence to develop into them. In christianity on the other hand, there are always unanswered questions regarding God, and the divine world. The analogy of scientists in the church is perhaps the religious fathers, who have studied and researched history, to develop christian doctrines based on spirituality, observations and a bunch of solid studies.

The acceptance of this unrevealed reality draws both scientists and christians to a common ground - humility, to accept that we are limited so we must learn and grow. And in both science and christianity, we are seeking to grow in the truth.

Perhaps one might argue, that science does not prove that God exists, while in christianity we believe in the existence of God. So, what/who is the God in Christianity? This God is perhaps not the God who is now being commonly illustrated by people in the world. God is not the existence of a supreme being who is an item in the world or above the world. God is also not a distant object who has wound things up and gone into retirement.2 Instead, in the book of Exodus, God tells Moses,

"I am who I am." One might say 'this does not illustrate anything'! But according to St. Thomas Aquinas, God's nature is to 'be'. 3 He is not the one being among many, nor the one contingent among many. He is the being. This is perhaps why we can experience God even when we are still. (Psalm 46:10). We need not learn to experience Him, or do anything to get a taste of God. Because by definition, God is the sheer act of being itself.

The Bible is not a scientific book that is composed by factual history but is one that contains inspirational insights. In Genesis, God creates the world

from nothing. He does not impose His will on some rival power nor on His creation. But rather, through a sheerly generous, non-violent act of love, God gives rise to all things. And the creatures, as the bible describes, are a relationship to God.2

The worm transitions to a butterfly, tiny seeds grow into giant trees and little babies become mature adults. The world continues to evolve and we continue to grow in God's nourishment. St. Thomas Aquinas says, God is still in continual creation. He is still at work and He is still creating. Our deepest centre was created by God and so therefore we are all interconnected by our bonding with God. A God who is provident and not distant.


It is divine love and grace which opened my eyes to appreciate the beauty of nature. And it is through this beauty that I have been immersed deeply in divine love.

UP CLOSE ISSUE 29 1:

SHANI PERERA is not your ordinary Catholic youth. She is an epitome of hope to those who have lost hope in serving the Lord as a "normal" person. Born premature, she developed an infection from a vaccine, which eventually paved way for some physical deformities. However, it didn't stop her from having a joyful life with Christ.

Today, she's the National coordinator of Jesus Youth in Sri Lanka, fervently leading the youth towards a Christ-centered life.

Q. Ashani, could you share your miraculous journey as a new-born?

A. I was born three-months premature and was kept in an incubator until I had gained enough weight. I was vaccinated for BCG three months after my birth. That vaccine had been affected by a germ which turned the tone of my body to purple colour within 24 hours, and my mom noticed that both my legs and arms along with the neck had collapsed. I had been left with a tiny breath and was almost dying. The doctors who examined me suggested that she leave me in the hospital, because I was not going to live more than a couple of days. My mom was an uneducated woman who could hardly read or write. But she was a fighter and never accepted defeat easily.

She took me to the Army hospital, and a panel of specialists took over my case and diagnosed that the Cerebrospinal Fluid was infected by a strong germ. They informed my mom that I might be a child with deformities. Though they could save my life, I was never going to be a normal child anyway.

My mom had a great devotion to Mary and an incredible faith that God will answer her prayers. Surprising the doctors, I recovered miraculously. Today, that child who was meant to be totally deformed is 34-years-old, with a deformed left hand and a weak right hand and is a graduate teacher. Yet, that doesn't stop me in the mission of proclaiming the love of God before the world.

Q. In spite of your physical problems, you are managing on your own now. Please share how your mother equipped you to overcome your physical challenges.

A. My mother is my role model and my inspiration in life. Today, I am who I am because of her incredible faith in me. She equipped me for life both mentally and physically; she believed in me and was always proud of me. That kept me from feeling inferior.

Amma took great pains to teach me to walk and do other physical activities. When I was in Middle-School, she taught me to wash my clothes. I found it difficult to do it with a single hand and she would say, "Not only your hands, but your feet were also created by God, so why don't we try to use it?" Together we invented many new ways and means of doing things on my own. She taught me cooking, as well. From scraping coconut to laying the table, from cleaning the bathroom to mopping the house, from sweeping the house to working in the garden, she got me involved in most of the chores around the house. No matter what, she never stopped training me for life.

I had short hair and when I grew older, I wanted to grow my hair but never realised that I was going to add another job to Amma's list. Since my hair was curly it was impossible for me to handle it single handed. But with so much of love, she did my hair and she continued to do so until her death. Not only did she train me physically but she also gave me a good vision about life. After my ordinary level exam, I wanted to do a computer course but we couldn't afford it. My mother sold her tiny gold chain and said, "Nothing is more important than education." Amma taught me how to love and sacrifice; how to find happiness in giving and letting go. Every single thing she taught me is making a huge impact on my life today. Her contribution is so immense that I can even write a book about it.



Q. Can you share your personal encounter with Christ? How did you come to know about the Jesus Youth movement?

A. Though I had a very unique encounter at my birth, it took me more than 20 years to recognize it. Today, I meet Him daily in my personal prayer, Holy Mass, Confession, Word of God, and sometimes in the people I meet, in life incidents; it also gives me the road map for the day. He keeps my smile unchanged no matter how gloomy or bright the day is.

In 2012, I was working as a tutor in St.Sebastian's College, Moratuwa. One day, the primary school Principal, Rev.Fr. Daya Darshana Perera called me and asked if I could stay back on Friday evenings and be with a few students who were coming together for a prayer meeting. I said "Yes" because I was free on Friday evenings. These prayer meetings changed my life. I came to know that they were Jesus Youth, and from there a new chapter of my life began. Today, Fr. Daya is the Chaplain of Jesus Youth, Sri Lanka.

Q. You are the National Coordinator and in spite of all the challenges, you are a strong witness to the youth and old alike. Could you tell us the secret behind this.

A. It's a public secret. You can call it 'Amazing Grace'. Becoming the coordinator of Jesus Youth Sri Lanka was totally unexpected. It's said that God has a tendency of picking up 'Nobodies' and making them 'Somebody' without consulting 'Anybody'. It is just His grace and providence in abundance that I am able to do anything for HIM.

There were a few things which made a great impact on my lifestyle. On the very day that I said 'Yes' to this new calling, the Holy Spirit compelled me to find a theme for my life; "Create a pure heart in me, oh God and put a new and loyal spirit in me" (Ps 51: 10), eventually, this became my constant prayer. On the same night when I was in prayer, this line from a hymn struck my soul, "I will hold your people in my heart" and I pledged and claimed it before the Lord.

During one of the retreats, I chose Jeremiah as my favourite prophet. Though I didn't know much about him, I started reading about him, which paved the way for reading and studying the scriptures a little more in my daily routine.

In a casual chat with one of our senior leaders, I learned that the personal holiness

of the leader or coordinator has great say on the growth or the downfall of the ministry. This conviction had a ripple effect. I longed to make confession, and that created a thirst to visit the blessed sacrament often and also a hunger for the Holy Communion, which gave me a great desire to attend daily mass. You see, without my knowledge, I found myself strictly following the six pillars. This drew me closer to Jesus and to depend on him for anything and everything. Though I have my own struggles, battles or imperfections, I know the love of the Father fills me with His grace and when His love overflows, all my imperfections are washed away.

This journey was never an easy one. The challenges made me depend on HIM totally. Many transformations happened in my life. My team, elders, animators, cellmates, prayer partner – everyone has been by my side to support me. So when I am in the midst of all these graces, and when I'm always protected by His providence, I forget about my physical disabilities. As I claim, "I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong." (2Corinthians 12:10)

Q. What are your dreams for your region?

A. I love to dream and there are certain dreams which have already come true.

For many years, Surali (another Jesus Youth), and I had the responsibility to do intercession and make tea during retreats. We used to make tea and wash cups while praying. Both of us dreamt about having intercession as a separate ministry and also to have a praying kitchen, where cooking and intercession happen together. Today, we are blessed with a strong intercession ministry and we also have a praying kitchen.

I have a long-cherished dream to take this Jesus encounter experience to the differently-abled people. I believe as a movement, we are called to take this light to them. I'd love to name it 'Gifted Ministry'. Because I have a strong conviction that differently-abled people are truly a gift, who shows us a different dimension of the love of God. But unfortunately, some are not given the opportunity to recognize it. I want them to accept the truth from the hands of God and to see His unique plan for each life. The same God who created me and uses me has created them and is going to use them too, to shout out to the world and tell about his unfailing love.



IN A NEW DIRECTION

Seema Thomas reflects on how the lockdown, rather than stifling the initiatives of Jesus Youth Singapore, has encouraged more creativity to flourish. world to a stand-still. Disruption to normal life has affected everyone – young and old. Families are spending more time together, since parents are working from home and kids are doing home-based learning. Mundane tasks like cooking, cleaning and hanging up the clothes to dry have become family projects; giving everyone a chance to put themselves in each other's shoes. We have found it within us to appreciate the so-called insignificant people in our lives – like the house maid, newspaper man, the gardener and even the occasional annoying neighbour who comes to visit. And it has been proven beyond doubt, that difficult situations like the one we are in now can dampen just the times, but not the spirit!

avenues of the mind are being explored, new ways of spending time personally and collectively have emerged and communities have begun exploring new media platforms to connect for prayer, discussion and fellowship.

One young mother in Singapore started writing down the Bible word-for-word as she was reading. and has been able to connect to the living Word in the most surprising way! Her love for the Bible was triggered by a retreat that she attended before the Covid-19 crisis, but it became flesh for her when she was inspired to use every free minute during the day to continue writing the verses. With her husband now working from home, she has enough support to look after her two young kids and still find time to sit with her Bible.

book and pen. Her prayer is that the Word of God may transform her completely and bless her with grace and direction in life.

The night vigil organised by Jesus Youth Singapore (JYSG) has been a source of grace and miracles for many; the community meets for sacraments and prayer overnight every second Saturday of the month and it is undoubtedly the most talked about event of the month. Since February this year, the team was forced to cancel the gathering for safety reasons and to enforce social distancing. But to cancel meant not having a source of input and fellowship, which inspired the team to think of an online platform where young people could still connect and spend the night in prayer. The first time, they divided slots among the people and offered different prayers until dawn. The next time, they improvised and had a whole programme

planned using Zoom, which included Bible sharing, intercession and even a fun online quiz using 'Kahoot'. To everyone's utmost surprise, we even had overseas participants from Malaysia and Uganda who prayed with the Jesus Youth in Singapore! The team plans to build on this further in the coming months.

Crucis Singapura (CS) is a flagship event for JY Singapore and this is the 10th year of the annual Lenten event. During CS, young people are encouraged to walk barefoot across the length and breadth of Singapore, in paths forming the shape of a Cross, while praying the guided Way of the Cross. Over the last nine years, this event has brought together people of different

ages and communities to partake in the suffering of the Lord and is usually held on the day before Palm Sunday so as to inspire a prayerful Holy Week. This year, however, the physical walk had to be cancelled; but the team was inspired to revamp and reload the event in a whole new way. What if we could invite Jesus Youth and friends all over the world to join us online in praying the Way of the Cross? What if we could use media to post our session online and make it accessible for all to watch and pray together? The media team took up this challenge and with the support of the content team and strong intercession, they launched Crucis Singapura 2020 – A Virtual Way of the Cross. The hourlong session that first went live on 4th April 2020, was packaged with touching testimonies and soul-stirring worship, all sequenced within a guided Way of the Cross. The pre-recorded video testimonies focused on the Jesus Youth lifestyle and living out the six pillars – by children, families and working professionals. Within the first few days, there were already about 1000+ views; the session stayed online for about six days until Good Friday. People from all over the globe sent feedback appreciating the content and remarked how wonderful it was that they were able to pray with Jesus Youth from across the world through this initiative. After this positive experience, the media team in JYSG has vowed to work more in the direction of using media to reach out to evangelise and to share the gospel to the world.

With the disaster of the pandemic looming above our heads, it certainly does not seem like a time to enjoy. But with the varied kind of personal and community initiatives coming up, one cannot help but smile and enjoy the moment. The hope is that the pandemic fades away, but the wonderful initiatives and good practices that have emerged may continue – until they are forced out by more creativity!

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
Perfect Love

We can be at home, doing our house chores and be representing Christ by giving thanks in everything we do, and by being caring and merciful to the people around us. 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
When Holy Spirit became the drawing teacher



SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

Adolf Goldwyn gives us a clear and concise understanding of what Spiritual Communion actually is and how we can prepare ourselves to receive it worthily.

o one could have imagined even a couple of months ago that we would have to live our lives as Catholics without access to our parish church and without the sacraments. And yet, here we are grappling with this dreaded virus and finding new ways to live out our faith during these testing times. Even in the midst of all this suffering and chaos, the Church through live telematic broadcasts has ensured that we have the possibility of participating in the Holy Mass online, listen to the Pope's Urbi et Orbi address as well as receive the apostolic blessing and be able to adore the Eucharistic Lord online. Many dioceses have reported a manifold increase in participation during daily Masses and other spiritual practices.

While this large online attendance has been an incredibly positive sign, we must also keep in mind Pope Francis'

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words that "this is not the Church". It is dangerous, he said, because people could start living their relationship with God "for just myself, detached from the people of God." I'm sure all of us are looking forward to the time when we can get back to our parishes and sit in those pews along with our fellow parishioners participating in Mass and reciting the prayers together, being able to receive sacramental absolution for our sins, and going back to our prayer meetings and fellowships. I pray that those days may soon be upon us.

One of the phrases we hear quite often during this time of online Masses is 'making an act of Spiritual Communion'. I had honestly not given this enough thought in the past, although I now realize how important it really is and how integral it is to the way we should be practicing our faith. In this article, I try

to answer some of the questions we may have about Spiritual Communion.

St. Thomas Aquinas explains Spiritual Communion as "an ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Holy Sacrament and a loving embrace as though we had already received Him". Many saints have written about the multifold benefits of Spiritual Communion. St. Teresa of Avila writes, "When you do not receive Communion and you do not attend Mass, you can make a Spiritual Communion, which is a most beneficial practice; by it, the love of God will be greatly impressed on you". Or as St. Josemaria Escriva wrote, "What a source of grace there is in Spiritual Communion! Practice it frequently and you'll have more presence of God and closer union with Him in your life." It is this passionate desire for God, which is at the heart of Spiritual Communion. Spiritual Communion is not something we must practice only

during the Holy Mass but frequently, even 'hundreds of times a day'.

SACRAMENTAL COMMUNION AND SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

St. Augustine talked about two sets of people, receiving the Eucharist; Sacramental –in which the good and bad eat of it, and Spiritual –in which only the good eat. Many times in the past I have been guilty of receiving the Eucharistic Lord even though I was not disposed to receive Him. That is when I became an example of what St. Augustine talked about the 'bad' receiving Sacramentally.

The Council of Trent (Session XIII, Ch.8) taught a threefold manner of receiving communion; Sacramentally, Spiritually and the third who receive both Sacramentally and Spiritually.

• Sacramentally – "Such are those sinners who do not fear to approach the holy

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mysteries with polluted lips and heart, who as the Apostle says, eat and drink judgement upon themselves"

- Spiritually "they are those, who inflamed with a lively faith which works by charity, partake in wish and desire of that celestial bread offered to them, from which they receive, if not the entire, at least very great fruits"
- Sacramentally and Spiritually "they are those who having proved themselves, and having approached this divine banquet with the nuptial garment, derive from the Eucharist the most abundant fruits"

Fr. Paul Keller OP in his article, Is Spiritual Communion for everyone? writes "The person who makes a Spiritual Communion should also make a Sacramental Communion if he or she is properly disposed. However, it cannot be the case that someone who is not properly disposed to make a Sacramental Communion could be thought to be able to make a Spiritual Communion, no matter the circumstances."

What we can thus infer from the above is that the graces of Sacramental Communion can be received only if we also make a Spiritual Communion. These two acts go together!

How do I receive the 'great fruits' of Spiritual Communion in these times? When we are rightly disposed to receive Holy Communion! That is:

- when we are in a state of grace
- we are not conscious of any mortal sin which we have committed and for which we have not yet been forgiven in the Sacrament of Penance
- we are desirous of receiving our Lord in Holy Communion but are unable to do so, as at these times

That is when we unite ourselves spiritually with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, praying to our Eucharistic Lord in the words of Saint Alphonsus Liguori: "Since I am unable now to receive Thee Sacramentally, come at least Spiritually into my heart."

But what if I have committed a mortal sin and do not have access to the Sacrament of Penance? Should I suffer the loss of not being able to make a Spiritual Communion until the Sacrament is available once again? No! The Catholic Church through the merits of the crucifixion, death and resurrection of Christ has given us a way out even when we are not able to go to confession amid this pandemic. We can still make an act of Spiritual Communion if we have perfect contrition!

PERFECT CONTRITION

Perfect Contrition is the sorrow for one's sins based on the selfless motive of love

of God and sorrow for having offended Him. This form of contrition has the power to obtain forgiveness of mortal sins if it includes the firm resolution to have recourse to Sacramental confession as soon as possible (CCC. 1452). Thus, an act of perfect contrition disposes our soul for Spiritual Communion. This is opposed to Imperfect Contrition or Attrition, which is a contrition of fear and can only be absolved through Sacramental confession.

4 STEPS OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

After we are truly sorry for our sins, we are better disposed to make an act of Spiritual Communion using the following 4 steps:

- Make an act of Faith make a prayer expressing our faith in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist
- Make an act of love make a prayer thanking God for His infinite love for us and expressing my love for Him
- Express your desire to receive Him Spiritually since I am not able to receive Him Sacramentally
- Invite Jesus to come into your heart with a humble and contrite heart, implore the presence of Christ in us just as we would if we had the opportunity to receive Him Sacramentally

All these 4 elements are present in the Act of Spiritual Communion prayer that St. Alphonsus Liguori gave us and which we repeat while seeing Mass online. If we do not remember this prayer, we can always say the simple but faith-filled prayer that the centurion made: "Lord, I am not worthy to receive You under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed."

Spiritual Communion thus has the power to fill our lives with great fruits and graces when we are truly prepared. I pray that this time of being deprived of the Sacraments may bring us to a deeper thirst and longing so that when this pandemic is finally over, we may be able to receive the Sacraments with renewed love and devotion.

Buried Treasure

A well-read bible is a sign of a well-fed soul. **Anil Israel** shares tips on how to enrich our souls with this buried treasure, which could be accumulating dust somewhere on the bookshelf



any of us who have been privileged to grow up in a Catholic environment might still find ourselves less familiar when it comes to the Bible, even though we might have been to every Sunday Mass and never missed Catechism in Sunday school or in a Catholic school. Somewhere along the course, we seemed to have missed preliminary instruction with respect to our own Holy Book, the Bible - Basic Instruction Before Leaving Earth. Regular reading and familiarizing ourselves with God's Most Holy Word somehow missed receiving its due emphasis during our initial formative years.

My dad gifted me a personal copy of the Bible when I was in the 11th grade. Somehow, I carried a false impression in my mind that, this is something I can

devote time to, at a later point in time, when I am left with plenty of time, after everything else was more or less in place in life. By God's grace, I accepted a selfimposed challenge to read the Bible in a year, when I stumbled on the internet and ordered for myself a free copy of how to read the bible in a year. This happened to be God's way of helping me prepare myself for the Holy Matrimony at the end of that year and 1 Cor. 13:4-8 became a part of my personal prayer ever since. I haven't read the Bible in a year for over a decade, until a few years ago, when I became convinced that this is the 'one necessary thing' (cf. Lk.10:42) we all need to be doing daily for our entire lifetime.

So why do we need to form a habit of reading the Bible daily? Firstly, to grow in faith. For 'faith comes from hearing'

the Word of God (cf. Rm.10:17). When we read, we hear God speaking to us and it becomes spiritual nourishment for our starving souls. Secondly, it is an essential part to follow the Master - to be His disciple. To follow Him, we need to 'be with Him' (Mk.3:14), not only before His Real Presence in the Blessed Sacrament, but also investing time in journeying with His Most Holy Living Word. For, "if you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples" (In.8:31). Only when we 'dwell' on His Word, will it take root in us. Only when we 'meditate on it day and night' (Joshua 1:8; Ps. 1:2), can we allow it to sink into the depths of our hearts and allow it to bear fruits in our lives, rather than merely retaining it as a memorized verse in our minds. Finally, for spiritual warfare. We are all called to 'put on the whole armour of God' (Eph.6:11). The only weapon in this spiritual arsenal is the 'Sword of the Spirit' (Eph.6:17). The rest of the armour is for our defence, but to counteract, we need to rely on the sword. Just as Jesus overcame temptation, because He knew the Holy Scripture. Like the psalmist, may we too learn to say, "I have stored up your word in my heart, that I might not sin against you" (Ps.119:11).

How do I go about forming this challenging habit? We can choose to follow one of the many ways available at our disposal. They say if we read on an average 4 chapters a day or 20 minutes daily, we can read the entire Bible in a year. Often, it is really motivating, when we are aware that there are others pursuing the same journey. Personally, I am indebted to a WhatsApp group, wherein the moderator posts every day, the portion to be read for the following two days. Whenever I lag, I try to invest additional time on certain days and catch up. Sometimes I can foresee that I will be falling short of time in the coming days due to other prior plans, then I try to read a little bit extra in advance, to avoid the portions from being piled up. When our fifth child was born, I ended up needing an additional three weeks. The following year, I finished three days before time.

"Devote all your time to studying the Lord's commands and thinking about them. He will give you the insight and wisdom you are looking for." (Sirach 6:37) This scripture verse further motivates me to pursue this journey of embracing Christ in Holy Scripture.

In this digital age, we are truly blessed to carry the Bible in our smartphones. While travelling or even when we are waiting, the Word of God is within reach and easily accessible. The DBRM (Daily Bible Reading Mission) App – a JY initiative, is an added blessing as it additionally rewards us with a new wallpaper every day, with a scripture verse from the portion of the day, and I gladly use it as my lock screen for the day. Bible study groups, physical or virtual, further help us grow and mature along this beautiful journey.

Last year, as part of our family new year resolution, we were inspired to write down one scripture verse on a post-it, from the scripture passage that we read during our family prayer and paste it on a visible place in the living room. We also record it in our family prayer journal. We praise and thank God for having instilled in us this desire for the Word of God and are amazed to see our children too fall in love with scripture at an early age in their life.

Charles Spurgeon, wisely remarked, "A Bible that's falling apart usually belongs to a person who isn't." A well-read bible is a sign of a well-fed soul. May we all enrich our souls with this buried treasure, which could be accumulating dust somewhere on the bookshelf or abandoned as an unused App. May the Eternal Word continue to nourish our souls. As scripture says, "Man does not live on bread alone" (Mt.4:4; Deut.8:3).

LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS

Neha Ann Manoj shares a beautiful testimony of how she experienced the presence of God during a traumatic event in her life

"I can do all things through him who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13)

e all have a story. The one God writes for each one of us. No matter where we are in the journey of our lives, there is a plan and a purpose for whatever happens in our lives and I want to illustrate this by sharing my story with you.

I am an ordinary girl who has been brought up in a Catholic family. I received my sacraments, attended catechism classes, sang regularly in the Church choir, attended the weekly Jesus Youth teens gatherings and activities and participated actively in the regular family prayers. However, I never experienced or felt the work of Jesus in my life until last November.

Everything was fine on that day. We had guests at home and after breakfast, my father went to drop them at the Church for a youth gathering. After they had left, my brother and I went to study as we had exams going on during that time. All of a sudden, I started feeling a pain in my abdomen. The intensity of the

pain started rising and gradually it reached a stage where I could not bear it at all and I started rolling around on the floor. My mother panicked and called my father to return as fast as he could, and I was immediately rushed to the hospital. I still remember that when I got inside the car, I behaved abnormally as the pain was unbearable. A few minutes later, we reached the hospital and I was admitted to the emergency ward.

The doctors initially thought that it could be due to kidney stones and gave me a dose of painkillers. However, the pain didn't subside even after an hour. They tried giving me various doses of painkillers and simultaneously did a couple of tests for diagnosing the reason for the pain. Doctors wrote off the possibility of kidney stones and appendicitis after the tests. During these hours, I was at my worst period of time. I noticed the helpless and clueless faces of my parents and the nursing staff. My mother was by my side reciting 'Hail Marys' relentlessly. Even during my intolerable pain, the image of my mother praying gave me some peace.

Meanwhile the doctors decided to do an ultrasound scan to know the reason for my

pain. By that time, around four hours had passed, but these four hours felt like four years for me because of the excruciating pain. Finally, the doctors diagnosed it as a cyst which made my ovary twist and recommended emergency surgery. My parents were given only 15 minutes to decide and I could hear them discussing about the operation. When I heard about the surgery, I was not scared because I just wanted to be rid of the pain; it was beyond my limit of suffering.

Later I was shifted back to the emergency room and there I saw my mom's colleague and close friend, Renny, who was also my sponsor for the sacrament of Confirmation. She stood near me, kept her palm on my forehead and started praying for me. From then on, I gained

more courage, even though my pain had not reduced. I could feel someone giving me more strength to bear the pain, and telling me not to be worried or tensed. When the nurses saw me lying down relaxed, they asked my parents whether my pain had reduced because for all of the hours before that, I was velling and shouting due to the pain. I knew it was not because of the pain reducing but because I felt that I was in the lap of Jesus.

During this time, preparations for the surgery were going on. I came to know later that the doctor for this surgery had taken leave that day and was supposed to go to another town. However, something stopped him and he decided not to go which is when he received an emergency call from the hospital for my surgery. Later, the doctor told my parents that he did not know why he decided not to go that day. Now I realise how my Jesus kept me safe and sound by arranging everything for me that day.

After nearly an hour or so, I was taken to the surgery room. On the way to the operation theatre. I could see my anxious father, brother and my tearful mother, but I was relaxed even during those painful moments. I could feel the touch of a divine power consoling me and taking me through to the theatre.

After I got discharged from the hospital, we went for a follow-up meeting with the doctor. The doctor told us that usually such cases are very critical and complex. However, according to him my surgery went very smoothly.

This whole experience has opened a new page in my life. I was able to realise the work of Jesus, my Lord, in me. I could really feel him near me and with me throughout.

I had my Year 10 board exams last month. All through the exams, I walked along with Jesus and during the time of examination, Jesus took care of me very well. Never in my life, have I had such confidence and satisfaction after writing any exam. Now I am not worried about the marks or the result because I know that Jesus is working in my life. He will not let me down and he has a definite plan for me. Having gone through this blessed and special experience, I am now able to get a deeper understanding of all the 'Jesus experiences' people have shared about during our teens gatherings.



THE KING'S SPEECH (2010)

ope St John Paul II, in his letter to artists in 1999 wrote that artists, in a way give voice to the "universal desire for redemption". To be redeemed - from the debilitating constraints and circumstances of our lives, thus transcending into the realm of peace, joy and tranquillity that our hearts yearn for - is indeed the universal desire of humanity. St Paul would even say that the whole of creation is groaning in labour pains for this redemption to be accomplished (Rom 8:22-23).

The King's Speech is an Academy award winning historical drama directed by Tom Hooper, in which Colin Firth masterfully plays the role of the future monarch, King George VI. The film opens with Prince Albert, the second son of King George V, addressing the crowd at Wembley stadium at the close of the British Empire exhibition. Because of his stammer, the Prince despises public speaking as he is sorely self-conscious of his own humiliation as well as the difficult position it puts

his listeners in. Bertie (as he is known to his family) is fed up of having tried multiple physicians before, all to no avail and yet, at the insistence of his encouraging and supportive wife, as a last attempt agrees to meet the Australian-born speech defects therapist Lionel Logue.

Although Bertie is far from impressed by Lionel's methods and mode of treatment, he decides to continue the treatment on seeing the result of an experiment that Lionel did by making Bertie read Hamlet's 'To be or not to be' soliloquy while listening to classical music, whence he was able to recite without any stammer. Meanwhile, a constitutional crisis is brewing in the Kingdom as King George V dies and Bertie's elder brother David ascends the throne as King Edward VIII. However, David is intend on marrying the twice married American divorcee Wallis Thomson, although such a marriage would be contrary to the laws of the Church of England, of which the reigning Monarch is head. And even though it becomes increasingly apparent that Bertie, the secondin-line to the throne would have to ascend the throne, his fears, including that of his stammer, prevent Bertie from taking a decision.

As the movie progresses, we see the friendship developing between Bertie and Lionel and how through this friendship, Lionel helps Bertie overcome his fears, and how Bertie in turn, taking the name King George VI on his coronation, through his radio-broadcast speeches at

throughout the Second World War, inspires hope and gives voice to a nation in its darkest hour.

Although the movie has taken artistic liberties with many of the historical narratives, it remains true to its central theme of healing and redemption - that nothing and nobody is beyond redemption, even when sin in its various manifestations fills the world around us. Most of us suffer - some to a greater degree than others, the consequences of the actions or inactions of the people around us; most times those capable and responsible to protect us are the ones who have hurt us most. Yet, the movie is a potent reminder that through love, friendship and trust, healing is possible, even when one feels all is lost and there is no hope left. And for this great message of redemption, The King's Speech stands out as an outstanding movie experience.


HOW CAN YOU EVANGELISE THROUGH FELLOWSHIP?


EVANGELISATION AT SCHOOL


